Whose eggs?

The bird that laid these eggs is a seabird that makes its nest on cliffs. It has a long neck and webbed feet.



Whose eggs?

The bird that laid these eggs is a festive favourite and is known for its red breast. In America, the bird of the same name lays bright blue eggs.



Whose egg?

This egg contains the same amount as 24 chicken eggs! It's is the largest egg of any living bird. The flightless bird that laid this egg is a fast runner.



Whose eggs?

The bird that laid these eggs belongs to the same family of mostly black birds that we see in the UK. The bird looks like it's wearing a grey waistcoat.



Whose egg?

This egg is the largest in proportion to the body size of the flightless birds that lay them. The bird shares its name with a fruit.

The bird that laid these eggs is a member of the crow family. The bird has a flash of blue on its wing feathers and is known for its screechy call.
